Brief Description: JGS recently received an interesting research request to look into the life and relationships of a young woman born in Jacksonville in 1899. The person requesting the research is a descendant of the son of the young woman in question. The son was born in Jacksonville, but after the death of his mother was adopted in California. The research takes us on a journey from Jacksonville to Atlanta, Alaska, and California. It is an interesting story because there are many sources of information AND many voids in the document trail. Along the way we find dead ends, supposition, and family stories -- but also many important events for which we find solid evidence of steps in the life of this young woman and her son. Ultimately, we are left with as many questions as answers, but also with a sense of the lives of the people involved and the many interesting twists and turns they experience. After the presentation Society members are invited to suggest other steps we might take to find answers to our questions.

Speaker Bio: Joel Warner has been interested in genealogy from a young age. He still has a pedigree chart which he copied from his grandmother's research at the age of 8, written in his third-grade penmanship. He spends much of his research time helping others get started in family history. He also likes to collect stories of those "coincidences" many genealogists experience when information comes together in the most unlikely circumstances. Joel and his wife Alzina are members of the Jacksonville Genealogy Society, The Southern Genealogist's Exchange Society, and the planning committee of the North Florida Genealogy Conference. Alzina is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Daughters of the American Colonists.

Using Find A Grave

This free site — <u>findagrave.com</u> — is well known in genealogical circles. It is a tremendous repository of ancestral information. Most genealogists use it on a regular basis. Here are some tips and some cautions when using this valuable tool.

Cautions

The memorial for any one person gives some very solid information. It tells where they are buried and usually includes some birth date and death date information. Caution: Those dates are often supplied by volunteers or family members. They are fairly reliable but should be verified with other documents.

Family information is one of the great gifts of Find a Grave. Parents, spouses, and children are all supplied in abundance. However, the person supplying it is a fallible individual like you and I. Oftentimes they have less than the full picture of the family. One memorial I used recently listed seven children in a family. I was very pleased and felt like I had made great strides with this family. When, through one of those genealogy coincidences, my daughter bought a random family bible at an estate sale in Virginia and brought it home to me (drum roll) it was for this very family. It listed not seven children, but thirteen!! Complete with dates and spouses! So, what I found on Find a Grave was helpful, but not final.

One other area where information may be incomplete on Find a Grave is with spouses. The person creating the memorial may be descended from a couple, one or both of whom may have had other marriages and other children. So, if I were researching my grandparents and found their marriage and their children, I may not know about a previous marriage and other children. This would give me a very incomplete record of the family. My maternal grandmother was a prolific genealogist. She had compiled thousands of names recorded on Pedigree Charts and Family Group Sheets. One day we were talking about the family records and she made a comment about how her brother Clifford has provided some of this information. It took me a minute to compute this before I said, "Wait, you don't have a brother named Clifford! You don't have a brother at all. There was just you and Aunt Helen in your family." She smiled her mischievous smile and told me that her mother was married once before and had some children, which she happily introduced me to through family records. So again, I had correct information, just not all of it.

Another caution, which is really a restatement, is there are many ways to get wrong information into this type of "community" record. So, there is an aspect of Find a Grave that is like family trees — they are subject to errors. But they also can be a huge help in focusing on parts of your family that are incomplete and even some you may not know even existed.

Tips

While this is not a "how-to" article on Find a Grave, there are some handy parts to the website which are worth pointing out.

First, for any individual's page, there may be spouses, parents, and children listed. They may look like this:

This is a live link to that relative in Find a Grave. So, if you find your relative on Find a Grave and there are links to their kin, you can go right to those Find A Grave memorial pages. You may find full names, birth and death information, the names of their parents or children, other spouses, and so on. Feel free to hopscotch through the links in Find a Grave to expand your family knowledge. Keep notes and don't get lost!

Another thing you might find is documents. It is not unusual to find an obituary or newspaper death notice included in a memorial. Other things might be there as well, so go through all the links, photos, and documents you can find.

A final tip is to note the cemetery links on the page. In the right-hand column, there will be information you can use in your research. It usually goes like this:

- The name of the cemetery where your person is buried
- Other cemeteries in that city or town
- Cemeteries in that county
- Cemeteries in that state
- Cemeteries in that country
- All cemeteries in Find A Grave.

These are hot links. Use them. If I am looking at a memorial for one of my ancestors with the surname Warner, I can click on the first link and see all the Warners in this cemetery. This usually includes females with a maiden name of Warner as well. If I don't see who I thought should be there, maybe they are in another cemetery in that town. I can move up a level and search for Warners in all the cemeteries in the town, or in the county, and so on up the ladder.

I think you will find this interesting and useful for your research.

Final Word

Find a Grave is not the only cemetery website, but it is the most used so far. There are about 190 million gravesites tabulated. Billion Graves is much newer and is moving quickly. They have the advantage of built-in GPS coordinates, so you won't have to wander around in a cemetery to find the grave you want.

ANC Explorer is a good site for Arlington National Cemetery. If you are working on Canadian lines, iCemetery may help. Currently, they only cover six Canadian locations. But check it out and stay tuned.

The CWGC War Graves site has nearly 2 million British casualties of the WWI and WWII cataloged. This includes 23,000 cemeteries in 150 countries, so it could be a good timesaver!

So, like most resources, there is a lot to be found. But we must use our critical thinking and always try for multiple sources. Ultimately though, we weave our family stories from threads gathered far and wide. Find a Grave can be a big help in the process.

The Family History Show in England Virtual Event – 20 February 2021



Cousins, Cousins, and More Cousins

From a genealogical research perspective, cousins are anyone with whom you share a proven common ancestor. Technically, this would mean everyone in an extended family, including siblings, would qualify. From the genealogy perspective, they are called brothers and sisters.

Cousin relationships are broken down generations. You count the number of generations back to the common ancestor then subtract one. Here is a simple example. It is two generations from you to your grandparents. Therefore, you are the first (two minus one) cousin with anyone that shares the same couple as grandparents. Terms like cousin once removed and twice removed becomes applicable when the cousins are an unequal number of generations from the common ancestor. For example, your children would be one generation further removed from your common ancestor, so they would be first cousins once removed from your common ancestor. Your grandchildren would be first cousins twice removed to your own first cousins.

Another factor that comes into play involves the concept of blended families. The legal definition of this concept is a family consisting of a couple and their children from this and all previous relationships. While some people view this as a product of the 20th and early 21st century, nothing can be further from the truth. The scenarios listed below are the result of blended families and their impact on genealogy.

Half Cousins: Half siblings share only one parent. This means that if one of Gene's parents and one of Betty's parents are half siblings, then Gene and

Betty are half first cousins. The half sibling of each of their respective parents would be their half aunt or uncle. While this is the technical and accurate terminology, in most cases they will be described as the other's cousin or aunt unless the discussion goes deeper into the genealogy research realm. Additionally, children of half first cousins are half second cousins to each other and so on because they would only share one common great-grandparent.

One-and-a Half-Cousins: This scenario occurs when two full siblings have children with two half siblings. In another twist, if a set of half siblings has children with another set of half siblings, the resulting children would be double half first cousins and would have the same descent as full first cousins. Furthermore, if a person's half sibling marries the person's half sibling from the other parent, then the child of that couple and the child of the half sibling who is related to the married couple will be double half cousins.

Step cousins: This scenario means they are either the stepchildren of an individual's aunt/uncle or children of a step aunt/uncle. No blood relationship exists between step cousins. In the case of an adoption, there does not need to be a blood relationship between cousins. The adoptees would still be considered first cousins. First step cousins once removed would be step children of your first cousins. The second step cousin is the stepchild of your first cousin once removed.

Cousin-In-Law: This is the spouse of an individual's cousin.

Figuring out these cousin relationships can be very confusing, even for experienced genealogists. One of the easiest ways to overcome these challenges is to invest in one of the many genealogy software products on the market that makes the process of inputting collected data easy. The features in most enable the researcher to select two individuals in the compiled research in your database, and identify whether they are related by blood and what the nature of the relationship is if applicable. Here is an example of a link for 2020 that contains reviews.
